




New, Collaborative Approach to Serving Families: Coordinated Intake & Referral

As part of a statewide program redesign, all Healthy Start Coalitions across the state are tasked with developing their own locally-informed Coordinated Intake & Referral (CI&R) system and as one of the first coalitions to pilot this effort, Healthy Start Manatee was thrilled for the opportunity to share our model at the 2017 CityMatCH Maternal Child Health Leadership Conference & Healthy Start Convention in Nashville this past summer.

Healthy Start Manatee staff Lauren Blenker and Marissa Bressi discussed the successes and challenges of forming a local team of partners to coordinate efforts and connect families



to appropriate services, while maximizing resources available in the county. This included developing a referral algorithm with small target populations and using the Continuous Quality Improvement framework to conduct testing cycles to perfect the referral process. The Cl&R pilot initially focused on parenting and pregnant teenagers, then expanded to include first time mothers, and now also incorporates moms in four targeted zip codes throughout the county. By July 1, 2018, testing of the Cl&R referral algorithm will include the entire county.

Healthy Start Manatee, along with several other coalitions in the state, received funding from the Florida Maternal Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting Initiative (MIECHV) to develop the Cl&R pilot framework and are, now, providing peer support and technical assistance for those Healthy Starts working to implement the approach as part of the redesign process.

Family Outreach and Education

The Healthy Start team shared lots of information on Maternal Child Health with Manatee County

families at the Home Visiting Coalition's holiday party, where attendees enjoyed photos with Santa, arts and crafts, music, and games, along with access to useful

community resource information.

Our team also connected with close to 200 family members at the school district's Migrant Education Program's resource fair, where we provided

information on Healthy Start programs and services. Families also enjoyed a visit from Santa, fun activities, and culturally and linguistically appropriate resource information.









Striving to Offer the Best Services Possible

In our ongoing quest to best meet the needs of our clients, the Healthy Start team participated in two, full-day trainings in the last quarter. In November, we had a great day of learning, sharing and team building during the "Strategies for Effectively Engaging Families," training, facilitated by Robin



Hart with Healthy Families Florida. This included special presentations by our partners, Barbara Brownell with Parenting Matters, and Anna Cismesia with Healthy Families Manatee. The session highlighted proven methods to connect with, engage and guide vulnerable families to voluntarily participate, follow through, and make choices that can improve outcomes.

In December, the team

attended the "Interconception Care Curriculum for the Healthy Start Program" training, which afforded our Care Coordinators an opportunity to strengthen their skills around working with women between/before pregnancies. This curriculum is based on the understanding that prenatal care often starts too late to prevent many poor pregnancy outcomes. Women who are as healthy as possible, before conceiving, have healthier reproductive outcomes.



Healthy Start Manatee Risk Screening Data

The Healthy Start system of care utilizes a one-page risk screening tool for obstetric and pediatric providers, as well as other health professionals to identify and refer women and infants who may benefit from our program. This collaborative system helps ensure that women who need our services are able to readily access them.

The Florida Department of Health collects prenatal and infant screening data on a regular basis for all counties. For the first quarter of this fiscal year, 1,366 pregnant women have been screened, making Manatee County's prenatal screening rate 81.6%. In addition, 1,307 mothers of infants were screened, making the infant screening rate 86.0%.
